Course Description:

This course builds on "Family Perspective I" by emphasizing how families engage with therapeutic change, as well as relationship-based approaches to psychological dysfunction. You will experience how multiple levels of communication, the shared process of making-meaning, and the exploration of repeating patterns can be a platform for therapeutic practices. You will learn skills built on the information science of cybernetics, as well as the emerging science of interpersonal neurobiology. By integrating models of practice with client problems, practice settings, and your individuality as a therapist you will complete the course with your unique therapeutic profile.

Course Goal(s):

This course will introduce students to the basics of a family therapy, and particularly systems theory, communications theory, individual and interpersonal processes, the role of family family structure, family life cycles, and intergenerational processes.

Course Learning Objectives:

Upon successful completion of this course, the learner will be able to:

- 1. Use the vocabulary of systemic family psychotherapy
- 2. Apply the principal tenets of intergenerational family therapy
- 3. Use skills and assessment techniques from structural family therapy
- 4. Conduct non-reactive interviews with families
- 5. Modulate therapeutic empathy with time and context
- 6. Construct basic genograms
- 7. Apply communication techniques to reduction of family stress

- General systems theory
- Intergenerational approaches to family therapy
- Structural family therapy
- Communications and experiential approaches to family therapy
